









Half the Global Population is Under the Age of 30




Regional Population Aged Under 30


% of total population 2012

- Focus on strengths
- Holistic
- Youth engagement

- All Youth
- Everyone's role
- Long term commitment









YouthPower: Definition of PYD

Positive Youth Development (PYD) engages youth along with their families, communities and/or governments so that youth are empowered to reach their full potential. PYD approaches build skills, assets and competencies; foster healthy relationships; strengthen the environment; and transform systems.

















Positive Youth Development Features

- Build skills, assets, competencies
- Healthy relationships and role models
- Belonging/membership
- Clear norms, expectations and perceptions
- Youth engagement and contribution
- Safe spaces
- Access to integrated youth friendly services









Positive Youth Development Measurement Domains

- Assets
- Agency

- Enabling Environment
- Contribution

PYD programs recognize youth's inherent rights, and result in youth who have **assets**, the ability to leverage and act on those assets (**agency**), the ability to **contribute** to positive change for themselves and their communities, surrounded by an **enabling environment**.

USAID's impact: healthy, productive and engaged youth

- Youth fully participate in democratic and development processes, play active roles in peacebuilding and civil society, and are less involved in youth gangs, criminal networks, and insurgent organizations.
- Youth are better able to access economic and social opportunities, share in economic growth, live healthy lives, and contribute to household, community, and national wellbeing.
- Youth have a stronger voice in, and are better served by local and national institutions, with more robust and youth friendly policies.

Expanding the evidence base

- Building girls social assets and healthy relationships
 - Implement girls mentoring pilot based on review of evidence
- Enhancing programs for adolescents living with HIV/AIDs
 - Engage youth to review evidence and give input on pilot
- Reviewing evidence about programs that integrate SRH programming with workforce development
 - Pilot integrated models to build evidence on cross-sectoral prgramming









Providing Guidance on Measurement

- Develop measurement framework and illustrative indicators
 - Support development of USAID F-indicators
- Develop references and provide support for PYD measurement
 - Toolkits
 - Training and Webinars
 - Technical Assistance
- Identify most important soft/life skills related to sexual and reproductive health outcomes and prevention of violent behaviors
 - Review of existing instruments to measure soft/life skills
 - Adapt and pilot instrument

Nicaragua TVET SAY – Approach to PYD

- The Nicaragua Technical Vocational Education and Training Strengthening Program for At Risk Youth (TVET SAY) employs a holistic systems approach to strengthen the private TVET system to better serve at-risk youth along the Caribbean Coast.
- Youth provided with relevant technical training, including soft and life skills, to become capable employees and entrepreneurs.
- Offers differentiated support for higher risk youth, including psychosocial, family, and related wraparound services.







Nicaragua TVET SAY - Results

- Build capacity of private TVETs to provide quality training and services to at-risk youth
- Establish partnerships with the private sector to place at-risk youth in jobs
- In the Caribbean Coast, 1,000 youth receive scholarships and employment support to attend TVET trainings
- Transform public perception of TVET as an effective means to prepare youth for employment
- Reduce youth involvement in crime and violence in the Caribbean Coast







Honduras Proponte Más - Approach to PYD

- Aims to reduce risk factors among youth and families at risk of joining gangs and/or engaging in criminal behavior in Honduras
- Provides support for alternative measures for youth in conflict with the law and in juvenile detention
- The project will build the capacity of youth-serving organizations to provide secondary prevention services, including family support; refer ARY and families to appropriate services; and strengthen family networks.







Honduras Proponte Más - Results

- Reduced empirically derived risk factors among youth and families
- Increased number of youth and families receiving secondary prevention services
- Increased number of eligible youth and families accessing additional support service
